


Readers share their honest opinion to help you choose the perfect campsite

Tyddyn Osgar CL, Anglesey

At over 26 miles at its widest point, Anglesey is the largest island off the Welsh coast and too big to cover in a few days on foot and bicycle. That said, Tyddyn Osgar CL, near to the lovely Benllech Bay, was a great base for a few days' cycling around this lovely island and we were able to visit many spectacular sites.

The generously sized pitches are in a grassy field set back from the road and give open views across the Menai Strait to Snowdonia. At the house, there is one toilet that has shelves of games, books and information leaflets and one roomy shower.

A nice touch was the notice at the entrance telling new arrivals which pitch they should use, making setting up quick and easy. While we were having our first brew, the owners wandered down to say a friendly hello and offer useful information about the local area.

The site is in the village of Brynteg, which has a pub nearby and a golf club, both of which offer meals.

Radiating from Brynteg there is a network of quiet lanes that are perfect

for cycling and, in only a few miles, you can be on one of the signed routes around the island.

Anglesey's coast is designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Anglesey is also a European Geopark for its complex geology and there are numerous nature reserves across the island. We planned days out to visit lots of these natural sites and so, with the exception of some parking charges, had a very affordable short holiday.

From the campsite we cycled up to Amlwch, a pretty harbour town, taking in Parys Mountain, the dramatic and colourful site of an old copper mine, on the way.

We also cycled down to the huge expanse of Red Wharf Bay, full of wading birds. We took the 'van and the bikes to Newborough Forest for some off-road cycling and visited the tidal island of Llanddwyn.
